

This talk is about two colonial cemeteries in and around Kolkata and the process of creating a digital archive to preserve their heritage in tandem with and supplementing the brick-and- mortar conservation projects. The riverbank of the Hooghly was famous for its European colonial settlements whose history needs to be better preserved and where the colonial built environment is disappearing due to decay and neglect. Using methods from Digital Humanities and evolving some of our own techniques based on the on-ground scenario and global south contexts, these two projects aim to piece together and preserve the fading histories of the Dutch and the Scottish cemeteries and to connect them with the larger narratives of colonial history.
