International Webinar on

Multicultural Doris Lessing: Lessing through the South Asian Lens

March 25 & 27, 2022 (Friday & Sunday)

Concept Note:

This webinar takes up the idea of the multilingual and the multicultural as tools of inclusion, from the presidential theme of MLA 2022, and wishes to explore the British Nobel-laureate, Doris Lessing's writings vis-a-vis women's writing in South Asia. Within Lessing's own scholarship this marks a continuation of the seminal work by Claire Sprague, In Pursuit of Doris Lessing: Nine Nations Reading (1990), as it tests the efficacy of Lessing's writings within the complex multiculturality and multilinguality of the subcontinent's literature.

Women in South Asia wrote from the colonial times in both the regional languages and English. In them we find the nuances of forms and modes that mark them out from the male literary canon. In this respect they engage directly with Lessing's concerns about the represented and the unrepresented, the canonised and the undervalued, the quotidian and the spiritual. Again, like Lessing, most of these women foreground the problems of existing within the folds of patriarchy and performing the roles defined by its institutions, like marriage, war, religion and educational systems. A comparative exploration of the study of Lessing's massive oeuvre and the vast, multilingual, women's literature of South Asia promises to be a fascinating journey, and will certainly bring out the points of coincidences and departures of the women's questions in the global North and South.

This webinar proposes to open the door to some of the possibilities of cultural and linguistic exchanges between Lessing and South Asia through interleaved readings of Lessing and the women's literature of the subcontinent, in both vernacular and English. Since Lessing was limited neither by subject, nor forms or modes, we hope to acquire a rich collection of readings.

Suggested areas for exploration of Lessing's works and Women's Writing in the subcontinent:

- Exploring Lessing's trope of 'free women' and women's writing in South Asia .
- Short stories, big concerns: Lessing and South Asia.
- Women Writers and their need to write their lives: Lessing and South Asia
- Portrait of a Lady in Lessing and in the visual media (including films and advertisements) in South Asia
- Translating Lessing
- Teaching Lessing/Learning Lessing (including students' papers)
